

be done. Unfortunately, there are still misinterpretations that occur by owners, designers, users, and others in the application of the standards. While the Texas Registered Accessibility Specialist "RAS" program has created a large number of individuals with in-depth knowledge of the standards directly benefitting those served by providing access to someone who can assist them with questions, the majority of the rest of the country do not have this service. One exception is California that does have the California Accessibility Specialist Program which has a significantly more intense test than that in Texas. Nonetheless, most of this country does not have a process for review of the built environment and there are few to consult on ADA, but even if people find a consultant that they would like to use, there is no way to know if that person really understands the guidelines. So it is truly a "buyer beware".

Accessibility Professionals Association would like to change all that. We are proposing a certification process which will create experts in ADA. However, the actual certification program is still sometime in the future due to cost constraints. The eventual program will certify individuals in potential ADA areas and perhaps provide certifications for FHA Specialists, ADA Expert Witnesses, National Accessibility Specialists and International Accessibility Specialists.

This eventual certification program will be a win-win for everyone. APA will gain national notoriety and recognition, and at the same time, certificate holders will be able to use their certification to expand their business and their sphere of influence.

In the mean time, APA is developing an "APA Specialist" designation program which will be awarded to individuals who attend specific ADA training and pass a written test. The designation will be limited to members of APA. We hope the development of the actual certification program will happen in the near future; however, we will need to follow specific national standards in the development of this program. An actual certification program carries great responsibility in both the development and administration of the program which is beyond the reach of APA at this time. Former APA president Mike Love is heading the committee to search for funding for the certification program. It is hoped that this first step of developing an APA Specialist designation will assist in that endeavor.

The first training for the ADA Specialist designation will take place at the annual meeting in January of 2016. Look for more information as the date draws closer and the annual meeting is announced.

Readily Accessible - A Personal Story

Though we have all read the phrase "readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities"; how many of us have thought about what it can mean to our clients, to the public and yes, to ourselves?

Most of us envision a request to convert a unit, a space, even a residence, to being accessible, often by a nameless unknown entity. A conversion that will need to be completed by some ambiguous later date, with plenty of time to locate, order, design and install or convert the elements needed to meet the needs of new tenant. This need is not always so impersonal. It can be a loved one, a member of your own family and not something that will be needed at some later date, but needed now, with no advance warning.

If you haven't prepared, you will be spending your time addressing these accessibility needs while your loved one is trying to cope with their illness or injury, and not with you by their side for comfort, encouragement and support. Don't wait until accessibility is preventing your loved ones from coming home. Prepare and plan ahead to ensure that they can return to their home; their place of refuge and security, when all else is falling apart around them. Continue reading.
